AMERICAN SPACES IN NEPAL DISCUSSES THE HISTORY OF AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE

To mark the 245th anniversary of the American Independence, American Corner Surkhet on July 16th invited Associate Professor Benjamin Welsh from Morgan State University, Maryland, to talk about the History of American Independence. Dr. Uttam Gaulee, a Fulbright alumnus from Surkhet and also a professor at Morgan State, was a special guest at the program. Dr. Welsh talked about the timeline of the American Revolution and Civil War, the Declaration of Independence, the role of slavery in the U.S. independence movement, the sovereignty of U.S. states, and the multiple layers of government in the U.S. Broadcast live through the Facebook pages of American Spaces, the event has been viewed around 200 times so far. "Books Beyond Borders," Eighteenth Regional
Book Club completes

From July 15th to 29th, REPS Mark Burrell led the eighteenth regional book club titled Books Beyond Borders and welcomed participants from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, India, Nepal, and Sri Lanka. To honor freedom and American Independence Day, participants read J.D. Salinger's The Catcher in the Rye. In the five hour-long webinars held on July 15 and 29, around 100 participants discussed J.D. Salinger's reclusive life and his literary contributions. In addition, the participants analyzed Holden Caulfield, the central character of the novel, and discussed a host of other themes, such as childhood, innocence, growing up, women, and sex.

MENTOR TALKS WITH FULBRIGHT ALUMNI

To mark the 75th anniversary of the Fulbright Program, American Spaces in Nepal are collaborating with the Fulbright Commission (aka USEF-Nepal) to invite Fulbright alumni to offer virtual skill-building/information sessions for Nepali students. The second program of the series on July 12 noted the Fulbright Program's positive impact on the lives of individuals and on global and local communities. Two recent returnees who are alumnae of the Fulbright program detailed their Fulbright journey, their educational experience in the U.S., and how the U.S. education has helped in their personal and professional growth. EMBASSY'S MAKERSPACE PARTNER CONTINUES TRAINING OF AMERICAN SPACES PROGRAM COORDINATORS

Embassy's makerspace partner, Karkhana, has continued training Nepali as well as regional American Spaces coordinators as part of a regional grant. The Training of Trainers (ToT) on July 9 focused on digital storytelling for Nepali coordinators. Since February, Karkhana has also been offering ToT to over 20 American Spaces staffers from Bangladesh, India, Myanmar, Maldives, and Sri Lanka, Titled South Asia Regional Collaboration (SAReMC), the project seeks to provide youth around South Asia pre-entrepreneurial skills - such as problem solving, creativity, public communication, and design thinking through makerspace-based learning techniques by leveraging American Spaces in the region.

Book Bus Continues Discussion on Gender & Sexuality

On July 23 and 25, 2021, Book Bus team organized the next two sessions of virtual book discussion, Nepal Reads: Gender & Sexuality with 19 participants. Readers shared their favorite lines and metaphors from the poems 'Elegy with Grown Folks Music' from the prelude of Saeed Jones' book How We Fight for Our Lives, and 'Into the Breach' from Ocean Vuong's poetry collection Night Sky with Exit Wounds. Participants also discussed the prevailing gender norms, and the gender inequality it has led to in our society. They expressed how Nepali society still has a long way to go before it rejects gender binarism. During the second session, participants read Ocean Vuyongs' book On Earth, We're Briefly Gorgeous and talked about the prolonged after-effects of war. They came up with different interpretations for the word 'survival' as it pertains to the book. While some participants related survival with living through the COVID-19 pandemic, others mentioned how survival doesn't just relate to big catastrophes but also to day-to-day life.

AMERICAN SPACES CONTINUE ENTREPRENEURS' TALK SHOW

On July 22, 2021, American Spaces in Nepal organized an interaction program with Mr. Suyesh Raj Pyakurel, President of Chamber of Industries Morang—Embassy Kathmandu's host for American Corner Ilam. Mr. Pyakurel talked about his entrepreneurial journey and the challenges he faced and overcame. He also requested the government to act as a guardian to encourage entrepreneurship in Nepal. Citing his own example, he emphasized how brain drain can result in brain gain to promote entrepreneurship and also noted the importance of taking calculated risks to grow a business. Broadcast live through the Facebook pages of American Spaces in Nepal, the program has been viewed around 400 times.
