I-94 Automation Overview

- CBP is undergoing efforts to streamline the inspection process, increase officer efficiency and reduce operating costs in order to provide better services and a more welcoming environment for visitors coming to the United States. One effort is the automation of Form I-94 in the air and sea environments.
- Regulations require a paper form to be provided to travelers arriving via air and sea. The paper form is processed at the ports of entry, collected and then shipped to London, KY for manual data entry.
- CBP currently obtains all the data elements found on the paper Form I-94 through CBP and other law enforcement data bases.
- On March 27, 2013, CBP published an Interim Final Rule (IFR) in the Federal Register. The IFR expands the definition of Form I-94 to include electronic means, allowing CBP to create an electronic admission record.
- The IFR also adds the CBP admission stamp to the list of alien registration forms found in 8 CFR 264.1.



Operational Overview

- The IFR becomes effective 30 days after publication. CBP will begin implementation of automation across the ports of entry on April 30, 2013.
- Once automation is implemented, travelers arriving in the air and sea environments will no longer be provided a paper form I-94. Instead, an electronic admission record will be created.
- All travelers requiring an I-94, will be provided a properly annotated admission stamp in their travel document.
- CBP recognized that Form I-94 is widely used by DHS components and external stakeholders. To address this need, CBP established an I-94 website, wherein a traveler can access their admission number.



Implementation Schedule

• Implementation will begin on April 30, 2013 at five pilot ports of entry and will continue to the remaining ports of entry over a total of four weeks.

Week 1 (4/30)

• Charlotte Douglas International Airport, Orlando International Airport, Las Vegas Airport, Chicago O'Hare and Miami International Airport

Week 2 (5/7)

• Major Air and Sea Ports within the following field offices: New York, Boston, Buffalo, Baltimore, Detroit, Atlanta, Tampa, Puerto Rico, Miami, Chicago, New Orleans and Houston

Week 3 (5/14)

• Major Air and Sea ports within the following field offices: Pre-Clearance, San Francisco (includes Hawaii and Guam), Tucson, El Paso, Seattle, Portland (includes Alaska), Los Angeles, San Diego and Laredo

Week 4 (5/21)

• All remaining airports and seaports



I-94 Web Application Overview

- The I-94 Web Application has been designed to provide travelers with the I-94 number that is assigned by Customs and Border Protection (CBP) upon entrance to the United States.
- Travelers can access the I-94 Web Application at <u>www.CBP.gov/I94</u> using an Internet-enabled device.
- Help is integrated into the interface using calendars, drop down boxes, and roll-over text.



Entering Information

- Information should be entered as it appears on the visa. If the visa is not accessible, use the information as it appears on the biographic page of the passport used to enter the United States. The following information is required to retrieve an Admission (I-94) number:
 - Family Name
 - First (Given) Name
 - Birth Date
 - Passport Number
 - Country of Issuance
 - Date of Entry
 - Class of Admission

Tips on Entering Information (1 of 2)

- **Family Name** Enter the family name as it appears on the visa under the Family Name or Surname field. If there is not a visa in the passport, use the surname on the biographic page of the passport used to enter the United States.
- **First** (**Given**) **Name** Enter the first (given) name as it appears on the visa under the First or Given Name field. If the visa is not available, use the first (given) name as it appears on the biographic page of the passport used to enter the United States. Do not include middle names, nicknames, or titles.
- Passport Number Enter the passport number as it appears on the passport biographic page. The passport number may contain numbers and/or letters. Be sure to distinguish between the two. Some commonly confused characters are the number zero (0) and letter 'O' and the number one (1), and the letter 'I'.




Tips on Entering Information (2 of 2)

- Country of Issuance Passport country of issuance is your country of citizenship as it appears on your passport. The country of citizenship on your passport is the passport issuing authority, regardless of the country the passport was physically obtained in.
 Birth Date Enter the birth date in the MM/DD/YYYY format or use the calendar option to select the date.
- **Date of Entry** The date of entry refers to the date you entered the United States. This date can be found on the admission stamp located on your passport.
- Class of Admission Your class of admission can be found on the admission stamp in your passport. Class of Admission is typically two to three characters which may contain number or letters.
